The <u>Atká Lakota Museum & Cultural</u> <u>Center</u>, an educational outreach of St. Joseph's Indian sits on the banks of the Missouri River in the heart of Chamberlain, South Dakota, a small town known for rolling hills, walleye fishing, and Native roots.

A stroll through the museum is a walk through the Lakota tribe's timeline, from their original setting on the Great Plains to their forced relocation to reservation camps.



Consisting of much more than displays and informational plaques, the exhibits feature video kiosks with short presentations on the lifestyle, and rituals of Plains Indians.


The museum's collection features contemporary art, historical artifacts, and educational displays depicting the proud heritage of the Lakota people. Their story is told through interactive displays, English-Lakota descriptions, and continues in the Gift Shop which provides local artists a venue to market their work.

Blokétu: The Warm Moons (Summer)

Throughout the summer, the camp moved often to follow the migrating buffalo. Packing, transporting, and unpacking the family's belongings were the responsibility of the women. They were also busy preparing food, making, and setting up the tipis. The girls received instruction in quillwork and helped prepare food by gathering firewood and water. Boys began honing their hunting skills while hunting small game. The men spent their time making weapons, hunting for wild game, and defending the camp. The summer months were also the time for ceremonies and celebrations.

Join us as we celebrate our 46th annual powwow -<u>Gathering of the Wakáŋyeja</u> - children. This is an enjoyable and anticipated event on our campus. It is a day set aside to honor and appreciate the rich and beautiful heritage of all American Indian people, but especially the Lakota, Dakota and Nakota tribes of the Great Plains.

Events begin on Thursday with a welcome from St. Joseph's Indian School President in the Rec Center; followed by registration on Friday with cultural activities taking place at the Museum, the dedication of the Equine Therapy Barn, and tours of the school and health care center, the day will end with a relaxing reception and Tiyóšpaye (extended family) dinner at Arrowwood Resort.

St. Joseph's campus, chapel and homes; the blessing of the powwow grounds will be held at 11:45 a.m. with the dance contests beginning at noon. We will wrap-up our weekend of celebration Saturday evening, with mass at our Lady of the Sioux Chapel followed by the awarding of prizes and an evening meal.

Contestants are divided into three age groups: Tiny Tots, Juniors and Teens. Both the boys and girls compete in Traditional and Fancy dance. The girls also take part in the Jingle Dress dance, while the boys are judged in the Grass dance.

A number of drum groups from throughout the Dakotas also play and compete. All contestants drums and dancers - are eligible for cash prizes.

All powwow activities will be held at St. Joseph's Indian School in Chamberlain, South Dakota. Visitors are encouraged to come early to tour the school and campus and to visit the Aktá Lakota Museum and Cultural Center.

MUST SEE EXHIBITS The quilt — owíyža

The Quilt - Owíŋža

opened on June 13 at the Aktá Lakota Museum. The new exhibit features quilts from 1893 to contemporary that are in the museum's private collection.

These quilts are a testament to the powerful tradition, aesthetic, artisanship, and resiliency of the Lakota culture.



When the buffalo was at the center of Lakota life, beautifully decorated hides, often with striking circular patterns, were common. As colonialism brought about the near-extinction of the buffalo, the Lakota turned to quilt making to replace many of the functions — both utilitarian and ceremonial — that hides performed.

The star quilt held special appeal because of its circular pattern and rhythmic repetition. "Everything the power of the world does is done in a circle," said Lakota spiritual leader Black Elk, expressing the centrality of the circle to Lakota thought. Today the star quilt is often the centerpiece in Lakota celebrations and ceremonies. The exhibit will be on display through October 31, 2022.

STORY TIME WITH UNČÍ & LALÁ


Story Time with Uŋčí and Lalá is a free public program that brings American Indian history to life through Native American literature. The program is primarily for children, but all are welcome.
